Innovations in Assessment



There are so many dimensions to the mysterious process of teaching and learning that I like to choose an annual theme to concentrate on. Past themes have been blended, active, and experiential learning. Last year's conference theme focused on critical thinking. CITE's focus for 2019 is on assessment of student learning and the new approaches that faculty may be experimenting with and employing in their courses. This theme emerged out of a conversation at last year's teaching and learning symposium between two faculty members, from different disciplines, who were integrating visual assessments (infographics and poster presentations) to create student engagement. Unbeknownst to one another, these two faculty were moving in the same direction to create more real-world assignments that might better demonstrate student learning. This is a local manifestation of a larger conversation.

At the Global Online Learning Summit in October, I heard Stephen Murgatroyd (Chief Innovation Officer at Contact North) proclaim, "Assessment is the new black." Assessment is fashionable, and a lot of people are staring at the runway of assessment for very different reasons. The first reason is the influence of technology and what it enables (both negatively and positively). The pressure points and opportunities to engage in academic misconduct have contributed to a consistent rise in contract cheating and have forced colleges and universities to engage in a technological arms race with students to prevent more sophisticated incidents of academic misconduct. There are now thriving online businesses for students to purchase term papers, pay someone to take a test, do their homework, or access an "editor-for-hire." (Bowman, 2017; Gallant, 2019). Many of these companies market directly to international students (Katkins, 2018). More sophisticated methods of academic misconduct are most prevalent for the two most traditional forms of student assessment - the term paper and the exam - and to combat them, Medicine Hat College now subscribes to the Respondus lockdown browser and has renovated rooms with surveillance cameras to prevent cheating. This is the negative motivation for change, and to change the nature of the game, faculty are rethinking their assessment practices. The positive motivation to rethink assessment practice arises

from the desire to be confident

that students have actually ac-

quired the knowledge, skills, and abilities claimed. Instructors care about their practice and their professions, and they want (perhaps need) to know that students are acquiring stated competencies throughout the course of their education. This isn't just about formal quality assurance (accreditation); part of education is minimizing the risk

that incompetence could play in seriously jeopardizing human safety, particularly in the cases of health-care workers, medical practitioners, or engineers (Katkins, 2018). Because faculty care about their students and their

professions, faculty care about quality, and the quality of student work is often the best indicator of the quality of student learning. This is a short explanation why this year's symposium will explore Innovations & Challenges in Student Assessment. It is a broad theme that touches every instructor's practice. Assessment is also some of the hardest work

of teaching. For many instructors, it is a necessary evil; it is grueling, time-consuming, and it can feel subjective. When faculty deal with incidents of plagiarism and academic misconduct, the emotional toll can be tremendous. And yet, creating new approaches is not easy. This year's symposium invites presentations on the difficulties and solutions

faculty are exploring to improve their assessment practice. What are you struggling with? What are you doing to enhance your practice? Hopefully, this theme will resonate with everyone. Please respond to the call for proposals!
