David Bouchard



Champion for Literacy/Advocate for children

"An acclaimed author of children's books, David Bouchard is also a champion of literacy. This former teacher and school principal has written more than 50 books in English and in French. Many of them combine poetry, prose and visual arts, and explore topics such as the environment, history and the traditions and cultures of Canada's Aboriginal communities.

Also a storyteller and sought after public speaker, he has traveled across the country to promote the importance and joy of reading and writing. In his presentations to children, parents and teachers, he addresses his own struggles with dyslexia. Proud of his Métis heritage, he is a former president of the Métis Nation of Greater Victoria and continues to serve as a community leader." ~ taken from the investiture ceremony of the Order of Canada, 2009.

David Bouchard's books have won numerous awards, including a Special Mention for Non-Fiction in the 2010 Bologna Ragazzi Awards for The Drum Calls Softly, a Gold Medal in the 2008 Moonbeam Award for I am Raven, the 2004 Governor General's Award for The Song Within My Heart, the 1999 Red Cedar Award for The Great Race and the 1997 Lee Bennett Hopkins Poetry Award for Voices from the Wild. An Aboriginal Carol was included in the 2008 White Ravens Catalogue.

In April 2009, Bouchard was named as a Member of the Order of Canada "for his contributions as an author of children's books and an advocate who has championed the cause of reading and writing, and who has shared his pride as a member of the Métis community through his stories."

David has received a remarkable honour: In 2013, in Oshawa, the David Bouchard Public School opened its doors.

Most recently, David was granted an honorary doctorate from Queen's University.

Design Thinking for Wicked Problems

Deborah Forbes

Medicine Hat College

The 21st century is fraught with numerous interconnected challenges: environmental degradation, terrorism, and poverty to name but a few. These are "wicked problems" as named by Rittel and Weber (1973). A wicked problem has innumerable causes and is difficult or impossible to solve because it is incomplete, contradictory, and shifting realities that are often challenging to identity. Conventional processes, linear in nature and problem-focused, may exacerbate these challenges by suggesting expedient solutions that generate undesirable consequences. The design thinking cycle is recursive, solution-focused, action oriented, and ever mindful of constructing a life-enhancing future. It is an ideal pedagogical strategy for engaging students in their consideration of wicked problems, what it means to think beyond one's self interest, and be a responsible global citizen of the 21st century.



Bio: Deborah Forbes is an artist, part-time instructor at Medicine Hat College, Public School Trustee and Executive Director of LEARN, Community Adult Learning Program. She has exhibited artwork nationally and internationally. Over the years she has taught in departments of Visual Communications, Arts, Education, and Early Learning and Childcare. Forbes' research interests include design thinking, chaos and complexity theories, and creativity and learning.

Timing the Transition from a Traditional to a Flipped Classroom

This is a cross institutional research project between NorQuest College and Medicine Hat College. Both instructors teach introductory accounting courses in the first year of the Business Administration Diploma. Our presentation will focus on the preliminary findings of our research.

The two groups both will have studied the same material via the traditional approach from the first 6 chapters in term 1. The traditional approach, which uses interactive tutorials and multiple choice quiz to access learning before the lecture in class. The lecture is designed to cover the most of the information in the chapter. The control group will continue with the traditional approach as described above. The experimental group will begin to do more work outside of the class to prepare for the lecture and textbook material ahead of time. This preparation will encourage students to come to class with questions and areas of concern. There will also be questions created by the instructors to test the student's knowledge before the lecture start. We will use clickers for the questions.

The student feedback gathered from the discussion and clicker questions will be used by instructors to customize the lectures to cover areas where students lack knowledge (real-time teacher). Time permitting, the feedback will allow for more hands-on problem solving. The students at NorQuest College will fully transition to flipped classroom in the first term after their first midterm. Both NorQuest and Medicine Hat will use the flipped classroom described above in the second term. Common exams will access learning. We can also talk about some of the benefits of doing research between two colleges.



BIO: Rick began his instructional career as a part-time instructor in 2002 in the then Division of Business, and as a full time instructor in the Global Tourism & Marketing program in 2007. Over the years, Rick has instructed courses in Small Business Management, Marketing, Human Resources, Cultural Awareness, Computer Technology and most recently, Introductory Accounting. During the 20 years prior to becoming a full-time instructor, Rick held management positions with for-profit and not-for-profit organizations.

As someone who returned to school later in life, Rick has experienced the benefits of Post-Secondary Education first hand. For this reason, he is passionate about the value of education to improve individual lives and societies as a whole. Rick was Medicine Hat College's Instructor of the Year for the 2014 – 15 Academic Year.



BIO: Sheryl Boisvert, B.Ed, CGA, CGA, is currently a full-time instructor at NorQuest College, located in Edmonton, Alberta, Canada. Sheryl originally studied accounting at Lakeland College and subsequently completed her designation with CGA Alberta. Sheryl later returned to the University of Alberta to complete her Bachelor of Education degree. The combination of both an accounting designation and a

degree in education has been very beneficial to her role as an accounting instructor. Sheryl has performed a variety of roles at NorQuest College since 2001, but has found being an instructor to be the most fulfilling. She has always believed that students gain a better understanding of the material they learn when they can go beyond the textbook theory and put the theory into practice. As a result, Sheryl has actively involved her accounting students in "real life" experiences like completing real tax returns for the Canadian Government's "Make Tax Time Pay" program, as well as entering students into the Annual Business Case Competition held in Alberta. Sheryl always looks for opportunities to make the students' learning more experiential and relevant as a way to keep the students engaged and participating.

Building Resiliency in Faculty and Management Relationships: Sustaining Educational Partnerships

Course Delivery in a 100% Paperless Classroom

Computer technology has changed how instructors teach and how students learn. In the classroom, instructors are using computer software to teach, while students use their own device (BYOD) to learn. Embracing and integrating computer technology in classrooms is a current way of teaching for better course delivery and learning outcomes.

A practice of 100% paperless classroom has emerged through the use of:

- (a) Learning management system (LMS) to provide exams and assignments online;
- (b) Textbook websites to provide e-text, power point slides and exercises;
- (c) Social media to provide instructor lectures in video as pre-class activity.
- (d) Microsoft 365 to provide handouts for students taking notes in-class.

In most colleges and institutes, education technology is available in classrooms. It is feasible to make pen and paper disappear in teaching and learning. The time is now to create a 100% paperless classroom.

Storytelling as a Teaching Technique

The use of storytelling as a teaching technique is a strategy which creates a bright and wide path to great learning moments. The history of storytelling from ancient times to the present is impressive, but as inspiring in the application of storytelling in teaching to make learning more personalized! Storytelling can make a difficult and convoluted subject more attractive and easier to connect with. Storytelling strives to envelope the topic in a more intriguing package which can create a significant audience learning moment. It can provide the audience with a real life perspective which removes the ambiguity and unfolds the meaning of a subject in a deeper and more meaningful way. Finally, for anyone who has listened to a great story it is the characters, the events, the unfolding story line, and often a touch of humour which makes this technique so thought provoking and valuable to the learning process.

David often begins his presentation with an honour song for his Kokum, his Grandmother. When he does, he asks listeners to abide by appropriate protocol and stand. For that honour song, he plays one of his Swamfox flutes. Migizi (Eagle) shown here, is one of seven spectacular flutes Swampfox created for the SevenSacred Teachings,

a book in which poet and flute maker collaborated. Through flute tales, David shares the history and legends of the Native Flute.

Using Portfolio to Teach Writing in Upgrading English Classes

If writing is a skill, why do teachers use assignments completed early in the term as part of summative assessment? Additionally, as with the teaching of any other skill, should teachers not provide continual coaching and feedback as students are improving this skill? It in the process of practicing and corrective feedback where the learning of writing actually takes place. No amount of "teaching" and "grading" can be as valuable as this feedback loop. Using portfolio as

a method of teaching is a valuable tool for encouraging students to continually strive to improve without the fear of being judged.

Community Research that Builds Relationships Within the Community

Robert Marvin Marlene Mulder NorQuest College NorQuest College

This presentation explores building a community focus on common challenges. Forty agencies that serve the marginalized invited clients (immigrants, Indigenous peoples and homeless or marginally homeless) to participate in research that learns about strengths and challenges in building a better life. This collaboration of Edmonton Public Library, service providers, researchers, and local government built relationship, identified common resources, promoted a sharing of efforts and information, and drew attention to the importance of social. This work created a framework for research and further efforts that connect college and community. We want to learn from our ACIFA colleagues in the discussion.

Currently he is a full time instructor in the Social Work Diploma program at NorQuest College. In 2014, Robert was one of the recipients of the Edmonton Men of Honor award. In Students We Trust: Dealing with the Anonymous Comments of Students in Evaluating Their Instructors Amir Fard

Anonymity in survey questionnaires (for example in the ETS and SIR II surveys) allows students to choose the wording of their comments free from thinking of any consequence. The comments challenge the integrity of the instructors and its

anonymous nature would equip students with the ability to mention things they would never say to their instructors. Anonymity would minimize the contextual capacity of the comments by the total removal of all background information regarding student-instructor interaction. It is important to know how to deal with such comments. And yet better, are we able to make a change for the better, together?



BIO: Amir is an instructor in Petroleum Engineering Technology Program, MacPhail School of Energy, at the Southern Alberta Institute of Technology (SAIT) where he teaches Petroleum Geology. 

Without 20 years of experience working with studio-based students and instructors at ACAD, and exposure to post-secondary schooling in Alberta through ACIFA, Chris could not be the "pedagogic rock star" [innovative teacher] he himself imagines himself to be.

Does it Matter what you do in the Classroom: The Impact of Teaching Methods on Student Preference and Learning

Stephanie PowersDustin QuirkRed Deer CollegeRed Deer College

What teaching methods most engage students? What most helps them learn? Does learning preference influence memory of concepts months later? Researchers surveyed first year business students on their learning preferences and quizzed them on theory they learned 6 months prior. Findings suggest that active learning is a crucial element in engaging students. Students prefer active learning methods and are more likely to remember concepts taught with active learning methods. Researchers identified combinations of learning methods that different cohorts of students enjoyed or found effective. The presentation will include illustrations of methods to engage students, including a life size monopoly game.



BIO: Dr. Stephanie Powers teaches Economics and Operations Management at Red Deer College. Dr. Powers has developed numerous hands on learning opportunities for her students. For example, students in Microeconomics learn about trade by making paper airplanes and Macroeconomics students play a life-size game of monopoly to learn about business cycles. In Operations

Management, students live the role of the manager, making decisions about location, capacity, and evaluating the quality of their own production. Her class activities have been expanded for larger class sizes and adapted for on-line learning. Stephanie measures the impact of these active learning techniques for her research.



BIO: Dr. Dustin Quirk is currently on secondment serving as a Chair in the School of Trades and Technologies at Red Deer College. His regular faculty position is as a Business Instructor at the Donald School of Business where he has taught courses on strategic management, business integration and corporate social responsibility for the past 10 years. Prior to joining Red Deer College, Dustin worked for over 5 years in various government policy and economic roles related to housing market analysis

and industry liaison. His research interests include residential construction (housing), business sustainability, and business education.

Using Mindfulness to Increase Resiliency Skills amongst College Student

Lakeland College

The ability to "bounce back" from life's stressors is crucial in today's ever-changing fast paced society. According to the 2016 National College Health Assessment, 90% of Alberta College students felt overwhelmed, 63% of student felt overcome by anxiety, more than 42 per cent of College students felt so depressed it was difficult to function and 13% of College students reported considering suicide. Mental health concerns are reaching epidemic proportions. Fortunately,

research, such as the study in the Journal of Personality and Individual Differences, found that "Mindful people ... can better cope with difficult thoughts and emotions without becoming overwhelmed or shutting down (emotionally)." When we learn to see our thoughts and feelings and recognize our body sensations by using mindfulness, we are afforded more space to make healthy choices on how to respond with wisdom vs. react in harmful ways to life stressors. Fortunate for educator's mindfulness can be taught.

In this session you will learn:

- 1. How negative emotions affect the brain and neuroscience implications for student's well-being and learning implications.
- 2. How mindfulness is linked to resiliency
- 3. Practical mindfulness strategies that can be used in the school campuses to increase teachers and student's resiliency skills.



BIO: Chantel Walker has worked in the education system for the over 20 years as a teacher and as a Psychologist in Alberta. She has a passion for education people about mental health. Her commitment to learning expands to include her own research; she has published and presented in person, and through webinars, and in numerous conferences within Canada and Internationally. In 2016 she was awarded the Murray Jampolsky Memorial Award for Outstanding

Practicing School Counsellor. Currently she works full time at Lakeland College providing therapy and psychological supports for College students. An Overview of Sexual Harassment law in the Alberta Workplace

Albertans have legal remedies if they suffer sexual harassment or unwanted advances at work. Employment contracts, the amendments to the *Occupational Health and Safety Act* coming into effect on June 1st, tort law, the *Alberta Human Rights Act*, and possibly the *Criminal Code* of Canada could be used against employers, supervisors or other employees.

A brief description of Monotype:

Monotype painting is essentially a technique where paint is applied to a smooth surface; a visual image is created using several techniques and then lifted off and transferred onto another surface; usually paper.

No two creations are the same. It is a very creative process with many mediums applied onto the original print to expand upon its visual interest.

The Relationship between Authenticity and Resilience

Though the phrase is used in a wide variety of contexts, there are two distinct types of authenticity. On one hand, it refers to realism; on the other hand, authenticity has another philosophical use. The latter refers to the existential question, one which has been shown to relate to the resilience in the face of stress (Ryan, LaGuardia, & Rawthorne, 2005). After introducing the two concepts of authenticity, the audience will participate in a think pair-share activity to generate ideas on best practices for authentic assessment.



BIO: Yoni is an instructor of philosophy, math, and statistics at SAIT, and a student at the U of C in the EdD program in Learning Sciences. His research is on discourse analysis, on how teachers talk to students and how students model their teacher's use of technical terminology. Yoni's interest in authenticity is a result of the constant tension between guiding students to take responsibility for their own learning while still having to serve as an authority figure.

Laughter Yoga Heather Taylor Old College



Laughter Yoga is the brainchild of Dr. Madan Kataria, a physician from Mumbai, India. Laughter Yoga combines Unconditional Laughter with Yogic Breathing (Pranayama). Anyone can Laugh for No Reason, without relying on humor, jokes or comedy. Laughter is simulated as a body exercise in a group; with eye contact and childlike playfulness, it soon turns into real and contagious laughter. The concept of Laughter Yoga is based on a scientific fact that the body cannot differentiate between fake and real laughter. One gets the same physiological and psychological benefits

Participants of Laughter Yoga report significant general health improvements. Many have felt a reduction in the frequency of respiratory infections like common cold and flu, and some others reported overcoming depression, relief/cure from chronic medical problems. With people's committed participation, Laughter Yoga has helped many people become healthier.

Clinical research on Laughter Yoga methods, conducted at the University of Graz in Austria; Bangalore, India; and in the United States has proved that laughter lowers the level of stress hormones (epinephrine, cortisol, etc.) in the blood. It fosters a positive and hopeful attitude. It is less likely for a person to succumb to stress and feelings of depression and helplessness if one is able to laugh away the troubles.

BIO: Heather Taylor has been instructing software courses for over 20 years. This is Heather's 16th year at Olds College. Prior to teaching, Heather worked in the oil and gas industry and owned her own bookkeeping business. In 2009, she discovered Laughter Yoga and has since become a Certified Laughter Yoga Teacher. In her spare time, she enjoys being with her grandchildren!

Exams as Learning Tools: A Comparison of Traditional and Collaborative Assessment

Sandra Efu

Exams are increasingly being used as learning tools in the form of collaborative assessments as opposed to their traditional use as a summative assessment tool for verifying individual student learning. This presentation shares findings from an analysis of 16 empirical studies from various disciplines that investigate the extent to which collaborative assessments improve student learning. It also presents the findings from a pilot study exploring two-stage exams, a collaborative method of assessment, in a first-year microeconomics class. This presentation further provides some considerations and good practices for instructors interested in using collaborative assessment in their classroom.



BIO: Sandra Efu is a Business Instructor at Keyano College. She has a Bachelors degree in Economics and a Masters degree in Development Economics from Dalhousie University. She is also a Project Management Professional (PMP) and is completing her Ph.D. in Higher Education: Research, Evaluation and Enhancement. Sandra is passionate about teaching and learning, and is constantly seeking new and innovative ways to motivate and engage students through experiential learning, using exams as learning tools, research, and community-based learning. Sandra believes that by helping students connect each

topic to the real world learning becomes a fun and engaging experience.


